The Southern Division is committed to help our Toastmaster members find their voices and achieve their personal aspirations through a club culture of care and excellence. As we head into 2017 and prepare for our Toastmasters Leadership Institute (TLI), this upcoming Saturday, January 7, 2017 in Colorado Springs, and for the new Pathways, which is the biggest and most exciting change ever introduced by Toastmasters, I would like to take a moment to look back at our last six months in Southern Division.

One of the first developments we created in Southern Division was to set up a Division Council. I deeply appreciate my superb team lead by Assistant Division Director, Deb Horowitz; S1 Area Director, Sunitha Mushini; S2 Area Director, Raji Muthukumarasamy; S3 Area Director, Ken Norwood; S4 Area Director, Dave Wheeler; S5 Area Director, Anil Dewan; S6 Area Director, Rusty Stephens; and Southern Division Retention Coordinator, Patty Saunders. Together the synergic efforts of the Council as well as other proactive Toastmaster leaders and volunteers have led to wonderful results:

- 92% of our clubs had four or more officers trained last summer.
- 100% of our clubs maintained their good standing by paying dues on time*
- Tall Tales and Evaluation contest season was a rousing success
- 96% of Club Visit reports were submitted on time
- All Areas are on track to earn at least distinguished status

*Coaching opportunities have increased this year as four clubs are now eligible for coaches and our Southern Division Toastmasters can use this opportunity to achieve another goal to their personal Distinguished Toastmasters (DTM) award.

Starting with the New Year we are now looking forward to our greatest challenge in the liftoff of the new Toastmasters Pathways. Granted, it will not begin until Summer; however, the preparation begins in earnest in the next quarter. It will profoundly impact every club and officer throughout District 26. Pathways will eventually replace the current educational program and for the next 18 months, members will begin migrating into the new system. To prepare clubs and members for this transition, our TLI, this Saturday, January 7, 2017, will have a major focus on Pathways. Everyone in Southern Division is invited to learn how we will be here to support you as you make your personal journey through Toastmasters!

To further serve our clubs and members during this transition, we will use our Synergy Group, which is open to all Southern Division Toastmasters to identify and recruit Pathway Guides. Pathway Guides are critical to the implementation and are needed to be the liaison for the clubs. Our ideal goal is to have one Pathway Guide per Area. Additionally, we will utilize our advanced club members, S-Peak Leaders, to vet and mentor members working hard to achieve their DTM under the current program within the next two years. We want everyone to succeed as we navigate our way into the future! As in 2016, we will work together in 2017 to reach our goals and grow!

Toastmasters get out of Toastmasters what they are willing to put into it, so this is an opportunity to not only get all of your officers for your club trained, but an opportunity for you to see what you may want to do in June 2017.

BECOME A CLUB COACH

Have you ever visited a club where its membership is 12 or less? Are you working on your Advanced Leader Silver (ALS)? Well, under our current educational program you can achieve your ALS by coaching or mentoring a club.

Throughout District 26 we have several clubs that meet the criteria to have a club coach and mentor. In some cases, there may be as few as five members regularly attending a club meeting. If you look at the roles based on what Toastmasters International suggests, you will see that the number of roles far outnumber the members. This is a great opportunity for you to bring in your skill set and provide new ideas and guidance as well as spark the energy back into the club.

Did you count the number of suggested roles? There could be as many as twenty. For instance, have you ever tried to count filler words, while timing and then also provide a quality speech evaluation all in the same meeting? It is not a pretty sight. Somewhere along the way, what you are getting from the meeting is not what you expected. Performing multiple roles is exhausting and it does not send a good message to potential members or guests. When you have multiple roles assigned to individual Toastmasters, it translates into a meeting where the quality suffers.

When members are outnumbered by the roles, certain roles are just not assigned; however each club has its own culture, so discover what they currently offer and suggest ideas on how to manage more effectively.

The ultimate goal of any Toastmasters meeting is to provide a quality time for those who have given their time to attend. If you are part of a club with a lot of members, you know that. Now is your chance to become the hero. You have the opportunity to help the club revitalize and it helps you achieve your personal goal of ALS.

Bring your positive energy to the club; remembering you are there to guide, not dictate, so the club will find its roots again and begin to blossom into a vibrant club.

- Provide round robin or panel evaluation based on number of speakers
- Increase number of participants or time, will beef up Table Topics
- Hold educational modules like Better Speaker, Successful Club, or Leadership Excellence series
- Invite fellow Toastmasters as guest speakers or provide educational extra
- Change the format of your meeting such as an Open House, Interactive Workshop, Formal Debate, Potluck Party, or any other idea from your club members
- Follow-up personally with members to confirm status

Remember a meeting is always a quality meeting and it is always about those who are in attendance and not those who have not shown up.

What Makes an Exemplary Club

Rich nurtured a small, cozy, family-style Solar Speak club. My 2014-15 term became renowned for "fun, leadership, and mentorship" as we saw our membership triple. During my term we achieved President's Distinguished level, the first time in over a decade.

The following Toastmaster year, 2015-16 President Pati Scamacca continue the path in boosting our club growth, by introducing a weekly "New & Good" members' report on real world wins. I stepped into the role of Foothills Division F3 Area Director and saw this area reach "Distinguished" level. This Toastmaster year, 2016-17 President Liz Malagisi accelerated momentum. Half of our annual vital signs were achieved first quarter.
