The 2016-2017 Toastmasters year for District 26 looks to build on the great success of the previous year. Many of the projects implemented by Immediate Past District Director Deborah Frauenfelder, District Director, Darryle Brown, and Program Quality Director, Rhea Thompson, are in full force for this year.

We have moved the D26 website to a new server that allows easier processing and quicker uploads. To this effect, every Toastmaster in D26 should know our website (d26toastmasters.org). There we house the District Dialogue as well as the list of leaders and how to contact them, our District calendar, and updates on events coming to District.

Our first big event of the year is to train a minimum of four club officers per club. We ideally would like to see all seven club officers trained. On the <u>calendar</u>, you and your members can see dates, times, and locations of upcoming officer trainings. Many club officers received training during the June Toastmasters Leadership Institutes, but due to schedule conflicts, others still need to receive training.

2015-2016 Your Accomplishments District 26

Congratulation District 26 for all you achieved during the 2015-2016 Toastmasters year.

Together we accomplished many goals.

We came close to achieving Distinguished District. Although we missed the Distinguished District goal, WE:



- ended the year with 178 paid clubs;
- ended the year with 7,778 payments;
- had 780 educational awards submitted;
- had 87 Distinguished or higher clubs:
 - 14 Distinguished
 - 19 Select Distinguished
 - 54 Presidents Distinguished;
- had 17 Distinguished or higher Areas:
 - 8 Distinguished
 - 3 Select Distinguished
 - 6 President's Distinguished;
- had 5 Distinguished or higher Divisions:
 - 1 Distinguished
 - 2 Select Distinguished
 - 2 President's Distinguished;
- built 16 new clubs with several more clubs ready to charter in the near future
 - which includes kickoff meetings
 - organizational meetings
 - charter celebrations
 - and many calls with sponsor;
- helped rebuild several existing clubs which allows those clubs to continue helping people find their voices;
- rescued one club the day it was closing
 - club ended the year President's Distinguished;
- documented processes and procedures for building new clubs;

- created a new Club Coach Contract;
- began training club sponsors, club mentors, and club coaches;
- extended our reach on social media by a magnitude of 100,000 or more;
- maintained accurate financial and administrative records;
- published 12 newsletters to keep the members informed;
- had radio coverage at fall conference and television coverage at the recent Cheyenne Toastmasters Leadership Institute;
- held 8 Toastmasters Leadership Institutes and nearly 30 Club Officer Training sessions across the District;
- trained hundreds of club officers every 6 months which helped achieve club excellence;
- held nearly 148 district level contest which provided for members to speak outside their clubs;
- held 3 District officer and leader training sessions;
- held 2 major conferences which provide even more opportunities for members to speak, and provide opportunities for people to learn event planning.
- began the process of transforming and updating out District Website;
- visited many clubs twice across the District from the northern Wyoming to the southern Colorado, from the western slope in Colorado to the west in Nebraska; and
- grew as individual leaders and as followers.

To consider how successful District 26 was, just compare our results to that of other Districts in Region 1. We ended the year producing the most total membership payments, the most total paid clubs, and the most total Distinguished clubs. District 26 you excelled within Region 1.



The District was a very successful this year due in part by an energized team of District Officer and Leaders. 
With the help of Commissioner Scott McInnis of Mesa County –the month of June 2016 was declared Toastmasters Month in Mesa County, Colorado.



IF YOU CAN SPEAK, YOU CAN WRITE

Stories from speeches we have already given can make excellent articles for the District Dialogue and other publications. The creative process of writing a speech is very similar to writing an article. Transcribing a talk we have already given, and revising it to meet the submission guidelines is just a short step from being published.



What if we feel we cannot write?

Personally, I took a creative writing class in college with disastrous results. My professor rejected my work and gave me such poor grades, I finally asked him, "Why?" We talked for a while; he was polite but finally blurted, "Steve, you can't write!"

Of course, I felt crushed and for the longest time I believed what he said. Then one day a friend of mine invited me to write articles his blog where I explained I "couldn't write." He helped guide me through

the process by proofing and editing before publishing my writing. That small successful beginning encouraged me to submit articles to magazines. Even if we believe we "can't write" chances are, a friend can be there to be supportive.

Good News

A standard speech is only 5-7 minutes long. That correlates to about 700 words. For an article all one would need to do is expand on sections that may have been shortened to meet the timeframe.

Newsletters, magazines, blogs, all have their own voice, so research is critical prior to submission. Explore what they are looking for, the word count, format, and look for other articles that may be similar in theme as what is being submitted. Once submitted, the editor will tweak, possibly rewrite, or cut copy to fit the voice of the publication. This is no reflection of the article, just the preference of the editor and the publication. ---end part 1.


















RECOGNITION CORNER
